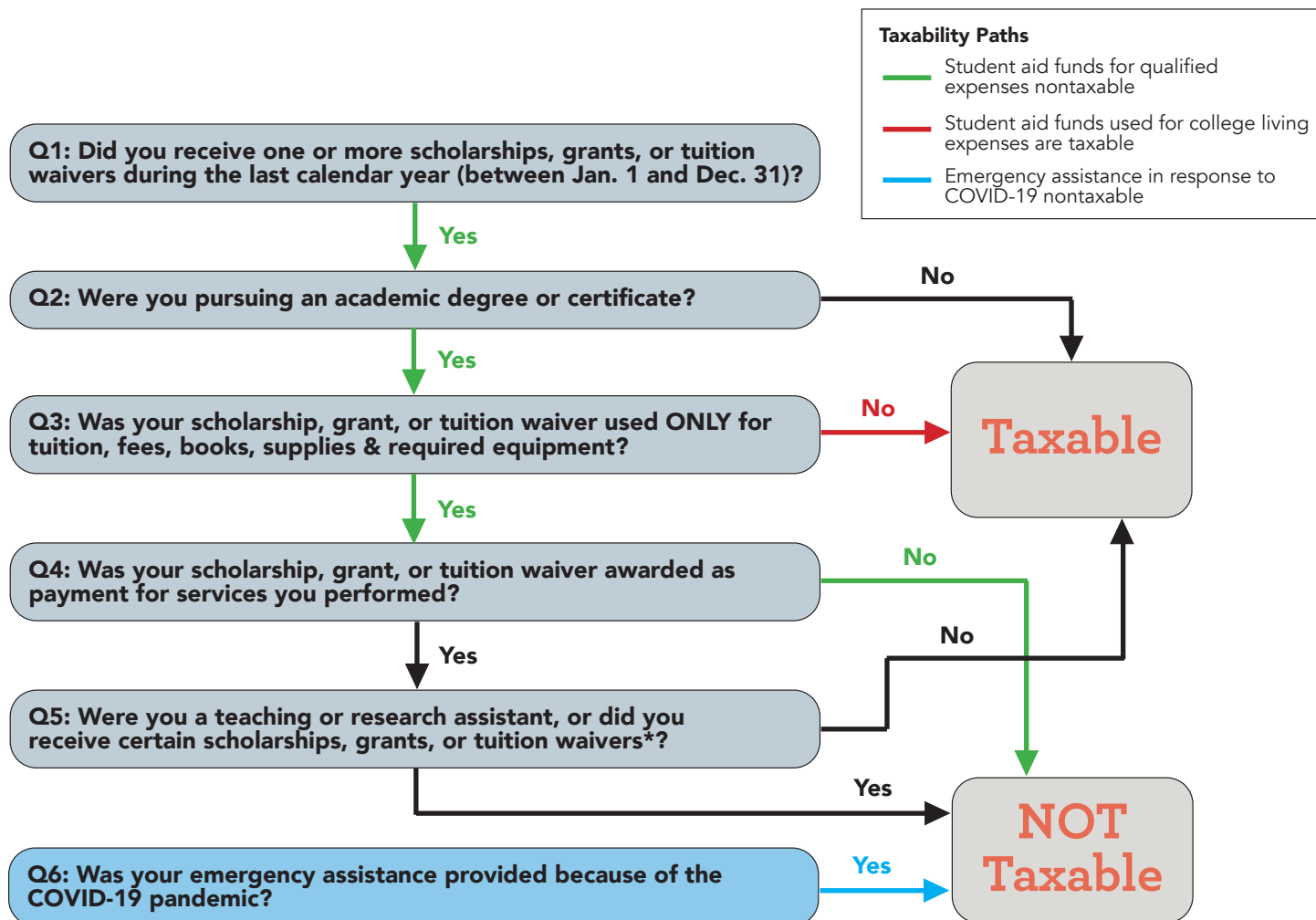


Are your scholarships, grants, emergency assistance or tuition waivers taxable during COVID-19?

Answer these questions to find out if you have to file a federal income tax return and if you might owe federal income tax on your scholarships, grants, emergency assistance or tuition waivers.

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Filing or not filing?

Q7: Do you have to file a federal tax return?

You must file a federal tax return if any of these conditions apply for 2022:

- Earned more than \$12,950 in wages, salaries or tips income, and taxable portion of scholarships
- You had net earnings from self-employment of at least \$400
- See Table 1-3 of IRS Publication 17 for other less common conditions

Q8: How do you report taxable portions of your scholarships, grants, or tuition waivers on the federal income tax return?

The taxable portion is reported as wages on line 1 of IRS Form 1040. Also, write the letters "SCH" and the taxable amount of your scholarships, grants, or tuition waivers on the dotted line next to line 1 if the taxable amount was not reported on an IRS Form W-2. If submitting electronically, follow online instructions.

Q9: Will you have to pay tax on your scholarships, grants, or tuition waivers?

Yes, if your adjusted gross income (AGI), including the taxable portion of scholarships, grants, or tuition waivers, is above the standard deduction of \$12,950 in tax year 2022.

Q10: Do you have to report scholarship, grant or tuition waiver income on your state income tax return?

Most state income tax forms base income on the federal tax form. You do not have to separately list the taxable portion of your scholarship, grant, COVID-19 emergency assistance or tuition waiver on your state income tax return.

Q11: Can you claim the American Opportunity Tax Credit (AOTC) if you used scholarships and grants for college expenses such as tuition, fees, books, supplies & equipment?

IRS rules prevent you from double-dipping. You cannot use the same tuition, fees, books, supplies & equipment expenses to qualify for both the AOTC and a nontaxable scholarship.

Q12: Will emergency assistance or stimulus checks I receive in 2020, 2021 and 2022 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic be taxable?

No. Due to IRS guidance (May, 2020) and the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Nov, 1988), emergency assistance associated with the COVID-19 Pandemic is considered nontaxable. See the chart on page one of this guide for details. A stimulus check (recovery rebate) is not taxable because it's an advance refund of a tax credit.
